HOLY WEEK MILESTONES



Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When you hear the word "service," who or what comes to mind?
- How is washing dirty feet an example of Jesus' service and power?

DEVOTIONS



Read: John 13:1-17, 31b-35.

Maundy (meaning *commandment*) Thursday identifies the day Jesus gives a new commandment and is the beginning of Jesus' glorification. Since John 2:4 when Jesus told his mother, Mary, "*My hour has not yet come,*" he made it clear that there would be for him a defining moment in his future. That moment, that hour, has now come. It is the night of Jesus' betrayal by Judas when Jesus gives a new commandment to love one another as Jesus has loved them. The example of that love is seen in washing the disciples' feet. Peter thought it was too humiliating for a teacher to stoop so low. Jesus said that later Peter would understand. That delayed understanding would come with Jesus' glorification through his death, resurrection, and ascension. Later, Peter—and the other disciples—would discover that Jesus would stoop even lower and yet rise even higher. Jesus' humiliation from the cross sets the stage for his followers to understand loving service as the height of glory in Jesus' realm.

Discuss: How does Jesus' example of loving service encourage you to serve?

Pray: **Almighty God, it is your will to save us through your steadfast love; help us to live Jesus' commandment to love that others may know of your glory and saving work. Amen.**

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Holy Week Readings and theme for this week, how can you serve others with a loving heart?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Light six candles of the seven votive candles shaped like a cross being used for Lent. Read John 18:1–19:42 or for children, read about the betrayal and death of Jesus in a storybook Bible. At the point in the reading when the death of Jesus is described, snuff out the candles and sit in silence for a moment while looking at the cross.

Then pray: **Lord Jesus, you stretched out your arms in love for us. Through your suffering we are healed. Open our hearts to receive your love and serve others. Amen.**
