Gospel: Mark 13:1-8, 24-37

Response after the announcement of the gospel:

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹As he came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, "Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!" ²Then Jesus asked him, "Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down."

³When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, ⁴Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished? ⁵Then Jesus began to say to them, "Beware that no one leads you astray. ⁶Many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and they will lead many astray. ⁷When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. ⁸For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

²⁴But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, ²⁵and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. ²⁶Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. ²⁷Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. ²⁸From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. ²⁹So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. ³⁰Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. ³¹Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. ³²But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³³Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. ³⁴It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. ³⁵Therefore, keep awake — for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, ³⁶or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. ³⁷And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."



PALM SUNDAY

Fifth Sunday in Lent

March 29, 2020



Today's reading is sometimes called 'Mark's Mini-Apocalypse' because Jesus predicted the destruction of the temple, Jesus' second coming, and the gathering of the faithful. In our modern understanding, the word 'apocalypse' is often seen as being about death and destruction, with post-apocalyptic movies showing desolated landscapes. At the center of Jesus' message though is a message of hope: God is ultimately in charge, even if the world seems to be falling apart.

Daily Bible Readings @ Home

Sunday – Read Mark 13:24-27 Jesus foretells the coming of the Son of Man which is generally seen as a reference to himself. How is this image of hope for those who believe?

Monday – Read Mark 13:28-31 Jesus compares the coming of the Son of Man to a fig tree. Spend time today outdoors, taking in the changing of the seasons, and reflecting on Jesus' words.

Tuesday – Read Mark 13:32-37 Jesus says that even the Son of Man doesn't know when the end will be, but he encourages his followers to keep watch anyway. What would keeping watch look like for you?

Wednesday – Read 1 Thessalonians 5:1-5 Paul writes about the coming day of the Lord, but for those who believe, Christ's coming is not something to be afraid of. Say a prayer of thanksgiving for the promise that all who believe will be saved. .

Thursday – Read 1 Thessalonians 5:6-11 Paul, like Jesus before him, encourages the Thessalonians to keep watch. How can you keep watch and encourage one another? Reach out to someone today to encourage them.

Friday – Read Romans 13:11-14 Paul encourages the Romans to live honorably in Christ Jesus. Do a good deed or small act of kindness for a stranger today.

Saturday – Read Mark 14:1-2 The religious leaders hatch a plot to kill Jesus. Why do you think the religious leaders want to kill Jesus? Pray for those who suffer persecution because of their faith in Jesus.
